



Q4b: Status of Single-Again Women






Q6: Where did you grow up?





GENERAL OBSERVATIONS AND RESULTS

he following summary statements, listed and divided by survey question, provide an analysis of the data collected through questions 2 through 18 of the Initial Survey. Statistical tests including ANOVA, Post-Hoc, Chi-Squared, and regression analyses were performed. The results of these tests are summarized below.

Optional Initial Survey questions 19-24, in addition to the final three required questions (25-27) are listed on the final page of this handout.


Questions 2-11 (Demographics)

- Three fourths of participants completed this survey in English, the remaining fourth completed the survey in Spanish.
- Single women in this survey are evenly dispersed across all age groups.
- Most single women in this survey were single, never married.
- Most single women in this survey do not have children.
- Most single women in this survey grew up in the United States.
- Most survey participants identified English as their home language.
- More than half of the survey participants (66%) grew up in the churches of Christ.
- An even stronger majority of participants (70%) are now members of the churches of Christ.
- Survey participants came from congregations of all sizes.

Question 12 (Expressed desire for marriage)

- Answering that they are not interested in marriage is the minority opinion of all participants.
- Most younger women say they are interested in marriage while more older women answer "Maybe," than say "Yes" or "No."
- There is a difference between the three levels of interest in marriage and a participant's contentment in singleness. Women who want marriage are the least content in their singleness. Those who answer "Maybe" are slightly more content, and those answering that they are not interested in getting married are the most content of all three groups.
- Most single women who are parents say they might want marriage while most women who are not parents say they would like to get married. (Age of the children was not collected as a data point.)
- The majority of single women want to get married, while single-again women are more likely to say "Maybe" to remarriage.
- The connection between home language and interest in marriage is also significant. The majority of native Spanish speakers want to get married while English speakers are more evenly split between "Yes" and "Maybe." "No" is the least common answer for both language groups, but a smaller percentage of Spanish speakers say, "No" than their English counterparts.
- There is also a connection between the region a population grew up in and their interest in marriage.
 - Participants raised in South America, especially the Venezuelans and Colombians, have a strong preference for marriage.
 - Central American natives still prefer marriage, but more of them answer "Maybe" than the South Americans.
 - o U.S. raised participants are evenly divided between "Yes" and "Maybe."
 - o Based on interviews and short-answer responses, U.S. participants grow up seeing singleness as a more viable option than participants in Central and South America.
 - o This aligns with findings about interest in marriage and home language.




Q13b: Relationship with God strengthened through singleness


Q13a: Content in Singleness



Question 14 (Levels of Support)


- Obviously, single and single-again women experience different levels of support in different environments including family, friends, local congregation, and work/academic environments.
- Family is the most supportive of single and single-again women followed by friends and work/academia. Local congregations are less supportive of single and single-again women.
- Family and friends support are not significantly different from each other, but they are statistically different from the amount of support gained from work and church settings.
- While work and congregational support are not statistically different from each other, the mean support from work environments is slightly higher than the mean support from a participant's local congregation.
- Churches trail other groups—even work/academia—in their support of single and single-again women. Online and local communities were least supportive of all.
- Churches are not across the board a source of support for single and single-again women. No other factors (age, marital history, parental status, past or present congregational involvement) alter this stat.

Q14b: Participants have the support of Friends








Q14f: Participants have the support of Work/Academic Community





Q14c: Participants have the support of Local Community










Q15f: Encouragement form Work or Academia





Question 15 (Levels of Encouragement)

- Friends (83%) and family (82%) are most encouraging.
- There is greater diversity in answers about church—over 60% say encouraging, but the rest say not encouraging—a significant group of dissenters (62.5%, 37.5%).
- Work environments are mostly encouraging toward single women (78%).
- Online communities are also moderately encouraging (68%).
- Congregational context encouragement is lower than encouragement from these other
- From most to least encouraging, the groups rank as follows: friends, family, work/academia, local congregation, online and local communities.
- Online and local communities were not statistically significant in their tendencies as more or less encouraging groups.




Q16a: I have found ways to serve in my Local Congregation



Question 16 (Inclusion in Service and Work Settings)

- Only the first of the statements demonstrated statistical significance, "As a single Christian woman, it is easy to find ways to serve within my local congregation."
- Most women (67%) agree or strongly agree that they are able to find ways to serve within their local congregations. The remaining 33% disagree (20% disagree, 13% strongly disagree).
- Summary statements regarding this question and the frequencies of responses were included in *One Single Reason*, Section III, Chapter 11.
- Comparison statements regarding opportunities for service in work settings or between single women, single men, and married women in congregational settings were not statistically significant.

Q16b: Easier for Single Men to Serve in Local Congregation









Question 17 (Included, Accepted, and Welcomed)

- Most participants agree that their local congregations include them as family.
- Most participants feel accepted in their status as single women.
- Churches are not deemed to be overly welcoming (61.2%).
- Most participants don't see single women supported in congregations other than their own. This finding supports the concept that support is not something you "see," but rather it is something you experience. Feeling welcomed, accepted, or included is part of RELATIONSHIP.
- The current church denomination of a single or single-again Christian woman is connected to how they view their...
 - o Inclusion in the church family.
 - o Acceptance within the church as a single Christian woman.
 - o Congregation's ability to welcome single Christian women into their assembly.

- Single Christian women say they hear the most negative comments from society.
- Local congregations also make a considerable number of negative comments towards single Christian women. Family members most infrequently made negative comments.
- When it came to positive comments, family made the most frequent positive comments followed by society.
- Local congregations made the least-frequent positive comments.
- Families of single Christian women tend to have more positive than negative comments, and society's comments veered towards the extremes (both positively and negatively).

 Congregations more frequently made negative comments than positive ones.
